MEETING THE NEEDS OF INUIT PERFORMING ARTISTS

Qaggiavuut is a non-profit, charitable society dedicated to strengthening and advocating for Inuit performing artists through professional multi-disciplinary arts training, collaborative opportunities and professional performance production.





OUR HISTORY

Since 2008, Qaggiavuut has been the voice for Inuit performing artists. Based in Iqaluit, Nunavut, Qaggiavuut is governed by a 9-member Board of Directors with an advisory council of Inuit artists and elders from Inuit Nunangat.

After years as a volunteer-run organization, Qaggiavuut won the Arctic Inspiration Prize in 2015 for the Qaggiq Project, now known as the Qaggiq School, to train artists and provide youth with performing arts programming in the Arctic. Qaggiavuut has leveraged the Prize to build its capacity and deliver programming that strengthens the Inuit performing arts through training, advocacy and creation.

OUR WORK QAGGIQ SCHOOL OF PERFORMING ARTS: INUIT ARTIST TRAINING

Since our inception, Qaggiavuut has provided skills training and support to over 300 Inuit performing artists. In 2012, we officially launched the Qaggiq School and began accepting students as part of our professional Inuit performing arts training. Our flexible training brings together Inuit artists and performing arts professionals to learn from one another.

Programs include innovative training in Inuit-specific performing arts including traditional Inuit music (pisiit), throat song, storytelling and drum dance from all regions, as well as contemporary performing arts.

The Qaggiq School offers artist training in:

ACTING MUSIC MOVEMENT STORY Directing Arts Management YOUTH Programming Technical Arts

DIGITAL LEARNING

Qaggiavuut is systematically recording, filming and producing **MASTER CLASSES** with Inuit performing artists and elders, to ensure Inuit arists throughout the country have access to training.

We developed the **PISIIT APP**; an interactive digital application to teach traditional Inuit music (pisiit). Elders teach the meaning, protocols and terminology of ancient Inuit songs and the app allows interactive learning without having to access the internet.







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TECHNICAL ARTS

Technical arts are taught through mentorship by experts in the technical skills of:

- lighting
- live sound
- sound recording
- digital design
- projection, camera
- video editing
- photography
- stage management
- makeup
- costume design

Training includes practical application of skills during live performances.

PISIIT COURSE

Qaggiavuut has filmed over 20 knowledgekeepers of pisiit, the ancient Inuit songs banned during colonization. In August, 2019 we delivered the first-ever Pisiit Course as part of the Qaggiq School, bringing together 32 artists to learn from 7 esteemed elders.



YOUTH PROGRAMMING

Over 5,000 children and youth in Arctic communities have participated in our Inuit performing arts programming. This year, artists from Arctic Song trained in youth facilitation skills with Apathy is Boring. They travelled to communities throughout Nunavut to build resiliency and confidence through Inuit music and to return drum songs to youth.

OUR WORK QAGGIQ HUB: INUIT PERFORMING ARTS & CULTURAL LEARNING

Qaggiavuut advocates and consults about the need for Qaggiq, an Inuit performing arts and cultural learning hub—a space to train Inuit artists and present the Inuit performing arts professionally in Canada's Arctic.

FEASIBILITY STUDY: In February, 2019 Qaggiavuut held an RFP competition to study the feasibility of a performing arts and cultural learning hub in Iqaluit. We are excited to be working with Savira Cultural & Capital Projects to build partnerships and gather research into building Qaggiq!

Since launching our fundraising campaign in 2017, Qaggiavuut has:

- Raised over \$500,000 in private donations
- Held 10 YEARS of consultations with Inuit artists, elders, stakeholders
- Formed the FRIENDS OF QAGGIQ, an advisory committee of Canada's cultural leaders
- Obtained preliminary DRAWINGS OF THE QAGGIQ from Diamond Schmitt Architects
- Developed a **BUSINESS PLAN** by Colliers Project Management
- Issued an RFP FOR A FEASIBILITY STUDY into the Qaggiq Hub and selected a firm
- Received support at ALL LEVELS OF GOVERNMENT, including the City of Iqaluit, Indigenous MPs, Government of Nunavut, Government of Canada and Senate Committees

Qaggiavuut, in partnership with governments, the private sector and other non-profits, is dedicated to producing and promoting Inuit performing arts work for export to national and international markets.

Our two professional productions, *Kiviuq Returns* and *Arctic Song* are showcasing nationally and internationally and we have partnered with many festivals, venues and theatres. QAGGIQ SCHOOL OF PERFORMING ARTS

The *Qaggiq Project* formally changes its name to the *Qaggiq School* in order to coordinate the delivery of Inuit artist training.

Group training is held in acting, music performance, pisiit, drum dance and movement with experts in the performing arts.

TECHNICAL SKILLS MENTORSHIP

Inuit artists are mentored by experts in the technical skills of lighting, live sound, sound recording, digital design, projection, camera, video editing, photography, stage management, makeup and costume design and arts management. Training includes practical application of skills during live performances.

INUIT THEATRE

Kiviuq Returns, an Inukut theatre production based in Inuit legend, is re-staged for touring in Greenland, Iqaluit and a 28-show tour at the Tarragon Theatre in Toronto.

INUIT MUSIC

Arctic Song artists showcase at the International Folk Alliance in Montreal and begin booking a tour of Nunavut, Canada and internationally.

INUIT PERFORMING ARTS YOUTH PROGRAMMING

Artist-graduates of the Qaggiq School deliver performing arts programming to children and youth in communities across Nunavut. In Coral Harbour, children begin singing an ancient song from their community that had been lost.

2017-18

KIVIUQ RETURNS

Kiviuq Returns is written and staged. It is created through collaboration with elders, writers and actors. Kiviuq Returns is staged at the Banff Centre, Alianait Festival, the Isabel Bader Centre and Harbourfront.

ARTIST TRAINING & CONSULTATIONS: Acting & movement for theatre, Directing, stage management

Working with Martha Burns, Carlos Rivera and instructors from the National Theatre School of Canada, Inuit artists develop skills.

QAGGIQ HUB

Qaggiavuut launches a fundraising campaign to build Qaggiq: an Inuit performing arts & cultural learning hub.

TEACHER TRAINING

Training in youth facilitation of performing arts is offered to 10 new artists from the Kitikmeot and Kivalliq regions.

YOUTH PROGRAMMING: KIVIUQ RETURNS

Kiviuq Returns tours Nunavut communities from all three regions, providing Inuit theatre and music workshops to over 5,000 children and youth.

PISIIT

Qaggiavuut films Inuit elders across Nunavut singing the songs once banned during colonization and shares the meaning of these songs.

STAFF

The Board hires it's first Executive Director and staff.

ARTISTS TRAINING & CONSULTATION

The largest gathering of Inuit performing arts was held in Iqaluit to consult about the need for a dedicated space for artists to create, collaborate, train and present. Over 3 nights, 85 artists created a performance based on the legends of Kiviuq and performed the show to a packed house.

TEACHER TRAINING

The first training program for Inuit artists interested in facilitating youth programming. Following the training, artists returned to their communities to deliver programming in throat song, guitar, drum dance, accordion and fiddle.

STRATEGIC PLAN

The Board of Directors hammers out a Strategic Plan including a Mission and Guiding Principles grounded in the principles of decolonization, inclusion, Inuit culture and language, healing and wellness.

INUIT LEGENDS FILMED AND COLLECTED

Qaggiavuut films Inuit elders from across Nunavut telling stories they are the memory keepers of.





2015 ARCTIC INSPIRATION PRIZE

Qaggiavuut wins the Prize for its Qaggiq Project to train Inuit performing artists and provide youth with Inuit performing arts programming.

2014 ARTIST TRAINING & CONSULTATIONS: SPOKEN WORD

Qaggiavuut gathers 40 Inuit performing artists and elders to build skills based in the Inuit storytelling tradition and contemporary spoken word performance.

2013 ARTIST TRAINING: ACTING IN FILM

Qaggiavuut delivers training for Inuit actors to develop audition and acting skills with professional directors, acting coaches and casting agents.

Over 75 professional actor reels are developed for artist promotion to filmmakers.

2012 ARTIST TRAINING & CONSULTATIONS: THE DRUM

The first Inuit Performing Arts Summit is held with 32 Inuit artists across Nunavut and stakeholders from the territorial government.

Qaggiavuut begins its tradition of delivering performing arts training and collaborative opportunities for Inuit artists.

OUR Impact

STRENGTHENING INUIT PERFORMING ARTISTS

TRAINING: The Qaggiq School of Performing Arts addresses issues of artist isolation, limited access to training opportunities and the lack of a professional performing arts infrastructure in the region. We provide a strategic plan to train Inuit artists and technical artists.

A BEACON OF HOPE: Research indicates regular exposure to the performing arts builds resiliency and a sense of belonging, identity and life meaning in youth at risk.

Creativity, honed through the arts, is the primary skill in critical reasoning, emotional self-regulation and problem solving. Qaggiavuut programming targets the communities with the highest rates of suicide in Canada.

INUIT LANGUAGE & CULTURE: There is no more effective means of building a language than through music and storytelling.

ECONOMIC STRENGTH: Since 2016, Qaggiavuut has brought over \$1 million per year in arts funding to the economy, providing employment and income to over 50 Inuit artists, technicians, arts managers and elders.
